STA Agenda Items

- Health & Safety of Citizens (Health Committee and Transportation/Community Development Committee members)
 - Bears
 - STA requests the City & Borough of Sitka (CBS), specifically the Sitka Police
 Department, in partnership with Fish & Wildlife Troopers to put down any bears that come into the residential areas of Sitka.
 - o This is of particular concern to us in the Indian River area. Again, we want to reiterate, as we did last year when we met, that it is not ok to have an expectation that people either just stay in their home or keep garbage in their home.
 - Higher fines are issued at Indian River, when bears are appearing in other parts of the community, the bear is shot but no bear has been shot at Indian River, residents are just expected to put up with the bears in their neighborhood.
 - Speed Bumps on Katlian
 - STA requests the CBS put seasonal speed bumps on Katlian Street during the summer. As Lincoln Street closes, traffic on Katlian Street increases as people try to bypass the congestion from the roundabout on to Lake Street/Harbor Drive over the bridge. Our Transportation and Community Development Committee and Resource Protection Committee have regularly talked about this and request action by the CBS during the summer of 2025.



Village Blight Clean Up

o STA requests collaboration between the CBS and STA to remove the dilapidated house that has fallen in the village. The Council will take actions necessary to characterize it as a health and safety risk and allocate ARPA funds necessary to pay for a portion of the funding needed to demolish/remove the house. We request the CBS also allocate funds (to cover the other ½ of the cost of demolition/removal) and finally we encourage the CBS to remove the barriers in front of the properties so the sidewalks can again be used by pedestrians.

Katlian Bay Road

O STA contacted Shee Atika to share safety concerns we have with the Katlian Bay Road remaining open during the fall/winter months. We understand the CBS has also expressed concerns to the State of Alaska. STA plans to advocate that the State close the road to vehicle traffic during the fall/winter months and only open the road to vehicle traffic during Spring/Summer. We join you in concern.

2. STA Contributions to the Community Updates (Finance Committee Council members)

STA Salaries/Fringe

The Tribe employs 81 staff year-round and an additional 30 staff seasonally. Our annual payroll and fringe in 2025 for employees is \$9,845,688. We had a compensation review completed in 2022 that benchmarked positions and raised our wages throughout our organization. We were found to be paying below market. Our employees spend their wages in the community and contribute to the economy.

Financial Assistance

The Tribe provides direct financial assistance to its citizens (TCs), other Alaska Native and American Indian (AN/AI) residents of Sitka, and organizations that provide services to Tribal households (HHs). On the next page is a table detailing our assistance programs and assistance provided between July 1, 2023-June 30, 2024.

In 2024, our Social Services Department collaborated with the Tribe's Finance staff to coordinate distribution of \$1,000 in federal ARPA assistance to all Tribal citizens who applied. STA assisted 3,281 individuals through this program - two-thirds of our enrolled citizens.

ARPA also provided us with additional resources to support childcare for Tribal households. We provide direct assistance with tuition for income-eligible Alaska Native and American Indian children to attend licensed childcare facilities in Sitka, as well as grants to the facilities themselves.

STA Transitional Housing Services, July 2023-June 2024

STA works in partnership with SAFV to provide transitional housing for survivors of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, and sex trafficking. The federally-funded program provides up to two years of rent subsidies and other services to help survivors rebuild their lives. Between July of 2023 and June of 2024, STA provided services to 18 survivors with a total of 17 children.

Local Food Purchase Assistance Cooperative Agreement - Contributions to Fishermen and Citizens

o STA received funding from the U.S Department of Agriculture to establish a new traditional foods distribution program that both helps fishermen and our citizens. In 2024, we had fourteen distributions of fish and served 3,897 citizens. We paid the fishermen \$212,296 and distributed 15,467 pounds of fish (halibut, king salmon, rock fish and cod) as well as 1540 pounds of Dungeness crab. This is an extremely popular program, and we are thankful to our grants/finance staff and social services for pursuing the \$2,000,000.00 in funding and doing the legwork to operate this program. This new program complemented our existing program, that has a focus on food distributions to Elders. This new program expanded our distribution of traditional foods to all tribal citizens.

• Department of Energy Grant- Partnership between STA and City

o STA and CBS staff worked together to apply for and receive \$150,000 for electrical grid resilience. This will allow CBS to purchase and install additional electrical infrastructure, like transformers. This Tribal specific funding is available for 2 additional years (\$150.000/ each year). The grant requires a Tribal match of \$22,497 and a CBS match of \$44,993 each year.



• Other Contributions to the Community

The Council allocates funding in their budget to contribute to various causes each year. Amounts donated to-date in 2024, are on the following table. A donation will be made to the Thanksgiving and Christmas dinner that ANS/ANB historically holds at the ANB Hall on each holiday.
